Course Evaluation Criteria

Reception: We would expect all children in reception to attain statements 1-5. If statements 6 or 7 are attained, those pupils are exceeding expectations.

- 1. Pupils know what an instrument is.
- 2. Pupils know the instrument names.
- 3. Pupils are able to count four beats repeatedly.
- 4. Pupils are able to play loudly or quietly.
- 5. Pupils are able to play fast or slow.
- 6. Pupils know that if an instrument is bigger, it will make a lower sound and vice versa.
- 7. Pupils are only able to play along to certain beats.



- 3. Pupils can play along in time to the performance videos to an okay standard.
- 4. Pupils can respond to different tempos while playing the Class Jam songs and can play the songs well at the fastest tempo.
- 5. Pupils can recognise the difference between Major and Minor chords/keys and different chord types.
- 6. Pupils can play along in time to the performance videos to a great standard.
- 7. Pupils can play along with the performance videos with no volume and it sounds great.
- 8. Pupils can play the separate parts well, using only the music booklets.
- 9. Pupils can play two notes on a keyboard at the same time.
- 10. Pupils can play every single instrument to a great standard.
