Over Subscription Criteria. Where applications for admission exceed the number of places available, the following will be applied in the order set out below:

- I. Looked After Children, including previously Looked After Children.
- 2. Special medical or social reasons.
- 3. Children who have a **sibling** at Wembley High Technology College on the date of admission.

This does not include the Sixth Form or Primary school.

- 4. Children of staff.
- 5. Those pupils attending one of the five Technology College **feeder primary** schools (East Lane Primary, Sudbury, Barham, Byron Court and Lyon Park).

Where the number of applications arising from this criterion exceeds the number of places available, those living nearest the College will be accorded a higher priority.

6. Those living closest to the College. Distance will be measured in a straight line from the child's permanent home address to the College.



Rest of the admission area: The school will reserve 31 specialist places for boys whose normal home address lies within the 'rest of the admission area.' Of these places, 9 are reserved for musical aptitude and 22 are reserved for academic ability. In the event of more than 31 such applications, places will be offered strictly in descending order of candidates' test scores.

Why do many people think that grammar schools are better than others?

The apparent success of grammar schools is simply due to the pupils coming from more advantaged social backgrounds and already having higher academic attainment at age II, suggests the research by Durham University.

A University College London (UCL) study has shown that UK grammar school pupils gain no significant social or emotional advantages by the age of 14 over similarly very able pupils in non-selective schools.

However, a study conducted by a group of universities, including the University of Bath, Bristol, and the Institute of Education at the University of London concluded that pupils who attend a grammar school end up earning more than those who attend comprehensive schools.

How Much?

Grammar No fees, but possibly increased costs for travel, uniform, activities etc.

<u>Independent</u>

Bursaries - up to 100% of fees **

- means tested **
- may be dependent on scores **

Scholarships

- rarely above 50% * (see next slide)
- often to highest scoring candidate
- may relate to music, sport, art etc.



Harrow, Eton, Westminster

- All Boys, All Boarding Schools
- Full, charitable scholarships
- Highly competitive

Independent Day Schools

- Foundation Scholars
- Full and part charitable scholarships

What is 11+?

- A set of <u>selection</u> tests to **indicate** academic ability and potential.
- Used by Grammar & Independent (private/public) schools to select pupils who will be offered places at their schools.
- Tests taken during autumn term of year 6 (some earlier – summer year 5) at test centres, (mainly consortia).

What is in 11+ test?

- Verbal
- Non-verbal
- Mathematics
- English (particularly comprehension)

 NB – changes in 'Test Body' e.g. CEM, GL, (formerly NFER), Moray House etc.

Glossary

- Academies: Schools which already select some or all of their pupils will be able to continue to do so if they become academies, but schools becoming academies cannot decide to become newly selective schools.
- Consortium: Schools in a group whereby the 11+ entrance exam can be taken at one centre and the results used to apply to more than one school in the group.
- Common entrance: Common Entrance Examinations (commonly known as CE) are taken by some children in the UK as part of the admissions process for academically selective secondary schools at age 13
- Free schools: A free school is a school in England funded by the taxpayer, non-selective and free to attend, but not controlled by a local authority.
- Moray House: Moray House Tests are verbal reasoning tests. They have been used for many years as part of the procedure for entry to selective secondary education.
- Multiple choice: Multiple choice is a form of assessment in which respondents are asked to select the best possible answer out of the choices from a list.
- Public school:
- The term **public school** is commonly used to refer to a group of around 10 per cent of the independent schools in the country, which are members of the Headmasters/ Headmistresses Conference and are in general older, more expensive and more exclusive.
- Standard format: A test paper that asks questions and has a space beneath for the response.
